We have a zero-tolerance approach and are fully committed to preventing slavery and human trafficking pursuant to Section 54(1) of the Modern Slavery Act 2015.

We are committed to ensuring transparency in our business and our disclosure obligations under Section 54(1) Modern Slavery Act 2015.


### Our supply chains and sub-contractor adherence to our values
